# Local firefighters respond to Kadena flames

**By 18th Wing Public Affairs** 9/28/2009 — Firefighters from Kadena Air Base, nearby Torii Station, and Okinawa City fire departments responded to a fire

Monday morning in a rural area outside Gate 3, on Kadena property.

The fire was contained in a 50-by-20 foot area on the east side of the base and officials believe that a debris pile was the source.

"The operation went seamless from communicating to requesting equipment, and knowing who's in charge," said Chief Master Sgt. Rodolfo Gonzalez, Kadena fire chief. "This is a perfect example of joint training that we have done with the Okinawa City and Torii Station fire departments."

There were no injuries, casualties or structural

# Ego check: A smack in the face by reality can be a good thing

**Idaho** – I majored in psychology in college, so Sigmund Freud was a fixture in many of my studies. I was constantly quizzed on Freud's theories of the ID, ego and superego. Freud's theory of the ego stated that the ego developed later in childhood after needs were met and the child began to experience life.

The ego was based on the reality principle; meaning our egos had to balance our needs with the reality of the situation at hand. I'm guessing this is where the term "ego check" came from.

I've had more ego checks in my career than I can count. I don't think this is a bad thing. In fact, I would say a healthy dose of reality will teach you important lessons in life, just when you think you know it all.

My first ego check happened when I was an assistant aircraft maintenance unit officer in charge at Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, N.C. I had been in charge of the unit for five months, waiting on my new boss to arrive. By the time she did, I was pretty confident — OK, cocky. I 366th Maintenance Operations Squadron

thought it was easy to lead the unit and was convinced if I left, it would fall apart. Before going on leave, I was doing an exhaustive turn-over with the new captain and chief.

Mid-sentence, the chief stopped me and said, "With all due respect LT, this unit will be just fine when you leave. In fact, this unit was generating aircraft long before you came and will long after you leave. Enjoy your time off."

Ego check: You ARE a very important asset to the Air Force, but you can be replaced at anytime, and the Air Force will continue to operate as it has for the past 62 years.

My latest ego check occurred about seven months ago on my first deployment to Afghanistan. After a couple of freezing days at the Transit Center at Manas, Kyrgyzstan, I boarded a crowded C-17 Globemaster III. Excited, I squished down into the center seats. I was going to war. My job: to generate bomb-laden aircraft to destroy our enemies.

Looking around, I was surrounded by joint tactical air controllers, rangers and Marines. I

was heading for Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan. The Soldiers and Marines had no idea which forward operating base they were reporting to. They were quiet, joking nervously, many no older than 18 years old.

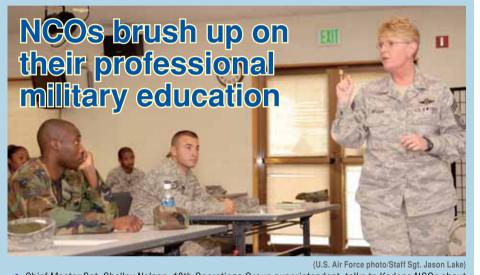
Ego check: I was going to war to generate bomb-laden aircraft to support the fine young men and women surrounding me on that C-17. I wasn't the "tip of the spear," they were.

Too many times we get caught up in the dayto-day grind, focused on "my needs and requirements" to make "my job" happen now. We often lose sight of the needs and requirements of those around us, trying to make their jobs happen.

I fully believe the job you are currently in, is YOUR most important job. And if you treat it that way, you will be successful. However, if you don't pause from time to time to see if your teammates have what they need to be successful, the Air Force as a whole suffers.

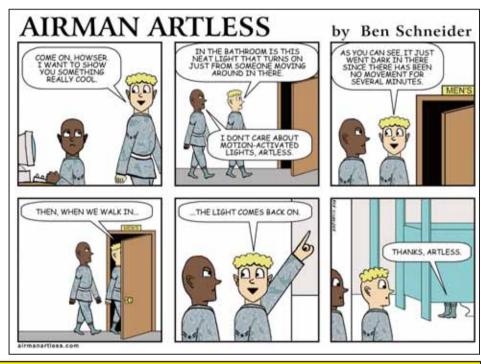
When was the last time you had an ego check?

**9/28/2009** — Effective Oct. 1, Kadena's Patriot Express will have a new contracted airline, aircraft and flight route.

According to 733rd Air Mobility Squadron officials, North American Airlines will take over responsibility of the contracted flight, flying a Boeing 757 with 190 seats. While the total number of seats on the aircraft decreased from the previous carrier, the new contract allocates 10 more seats for Kadena personnel than before.

"The biggest change under the new carrier will be the route," said Master Sgt. Richard Malik, 733rd AMC passenger services superintendent. "The previous mission flew to Iwakuni Marine Corps Air Station and Yokota Air Base. The new route stops only at Yokota to pick up and drop off passengers and then refuels in Anchorage, Alaska."

The new Patriot Express mission starts in Seattle on Thursdays with a three-hour layover at Yokota on Fridays before arriving at Kadena around noon on Fridays. There will be a three-hour layover at Kadena before departing for Yokota at 3:30 p.m. the same day. The mission will have another three hour layover at Yokota before arriving back in Seattle at approximately 4:45 p.m. on Fridays.

To avoid long lines on Fridays, AMC terminal still offers early check-in from noon to 9 p.m. on Thursdays for passengers with transportation management office reservations. Just as before, unused seats are made available for spaceavailable passengers wanting to travel.

"TMO is the first stop for personnel that are PCSing or going TDY to reserve their seat," explained Sergeant Malik. "For personnel going on leave, they need to visit the passenger terminal to sign up for space-available seats."

Earlier this year Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Norton Schwartz and Secretary of the Air Force Michael Donley designated July 2009 to July 2010 as the "Year of the Air Force Family," a year-long focus on Air Force programs highlighting the importance of, and commitment to, the entire Air Force family: all Airmen, married and single; spouses; children; Air Force civilians; extended families; and retirees.

"We will devote this year to identifying what we are doing right and what we need to do better to support the entire Air Force family, and to rekindle the sense of community that has been our tradition for so many generations," General Schwartz said.

Findings from the April "Caring for

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People" forum provided direction for the year-long focus that highlights improvements to existing programs. It also introduces new initiatives built on four pillars that meet the unique needs of Air Force families to include health and wellness; Airman and family support; education, development and employment; and Airman and family housing.

Together with Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force James Roy, the service's senior leaders are addressing key areas of concern to Airmen. Some of the programs receiving special emphasis include deployment support, fitness, family safety awareness, exceptional family member programs and single Airmen Initiatives.

"You can rest assured that taking care of families is a solemn promise we make to each Airman and family and one that Chief Roy, General Schwartz, and I each take very seriously," Secretary Donley said. "And we make this commitment not only because it's the right thing to do for our Airmen, but because it is the smart thing to do for our Air Force."

# Zoa Linsey sweeps North American championships

Torii Station Public Affairs Officer 9/29/2009 — Zoa Linsey, a lifestyle consultant and certified personal trainer at Risner Gym on Kadena Air Base, has just returned from competing in the North American Bodybuilding Championships where she came in First Place in the Women's Heavyweight category and First Place in the Overall category, and earned her professional status with the International Federation of Bodybuilding.

"There's only about 50 active professional women bodybuilders in the world—it's a very elite group of athletes. They only give out one female procard a year in Canada, and five or six a year in the States," said Linsey.

"I'm very proud of her and I'm looking forward to seeing her do well as a pro," said Zoa's husband, Joseph Kumzak, Director, Torii Station Gym.

The championships were held in Cleveland, Ohio on Aug. 29th. The judging criteria consisted of conditioning, symmetry and muscularity.

Additionally, competitors were required to perform a free-posing 60-90-second choreographed routine as well as the mandatory posing round, including front double biceps, side chest, rear double biceps, side triceps and abs & thighs.

At the North American, Linsey

won the heavyweight and the overall in the open class competition, competing against four classes: lightweight, middle weight, light/heavyweight and heavy weight.

She also won the heavyweight masters and the overall masters category. The Masters class category is open for women 35 and up, and is divided into two weight classes: lightweight and heavyweight.

As a professional bodybuilder, Zoa, who stands at 5'10" and weighs 180 pounds, is now eligible to compete against the top 30 female bodybuilders in the world and is hoping to qualify to compete at the Ms. Olympia competition, the "Superbowl" of bodybuilding, in October 2010.

"Once you compete on a professional level, the bodybuilders you compete against are from all over the world. I compete for money as a professional and compete in shows that are open only to other professional athletes," she said.

"Bodybuilding is a sport where the most disciplined person typically thrives. People who are smart enough are able to see into the future that their actions right now count. It's a very interesting sport, but it's difficult for a lot of people to understand," she said.

One question she is asked frequently is, "How long are you going

to do this – you're 37?"

"The interesting thing is that the best female bodybuilders are in their forties because that's how long it takes to put on that density and size. Last weekend at the Atlantic City Pro, the woman who won the overall was 52 years old. It's a sport where women can actually get better as we age because by lifting weights, we combat aging," she said.

Her next endeavor is to hopefully compete in the Arnold Classic, the

second largest show in the world, which will be held in Columbus, Ohio, on March 5th. It is by invitation only, and only 15 women in the world get invited.

"I'm applying to do the Arnold Classic. It's called the Ms. International and will be on the same day as Joseph's birthday! I'll find out in December if I'm going to be accepted for that. If I don't, I'll do the New York pro in May. Either way, I'm prepping," she said.

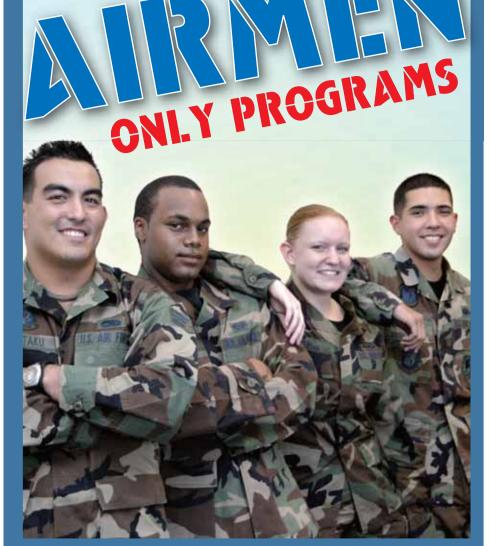

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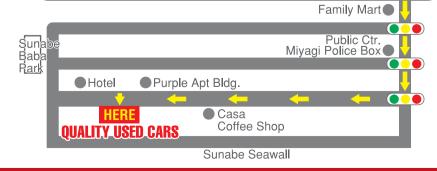
